The past year, in which celebrated our 70th birthday, has been remarkable for our 2nd Baldock Scouts Group, with our Beavers, Cubs and Scouts enjoying countless adventures while our organization continues to strengthen. Our young people have thrived, our membership has grown, and our financial position is secure - all thanks to the dedication of our Leaders, Trustees, and Parent Volunteers.

With our Trustee Board now firmly established for a full year, we've focused on enhancing our governance practices, implementing a Risk Register and establishing a Reserves Policy. In parallel our Group Leadership Team has focused on delivering an exceptional programme of activities across all Sections.

Our fundraising efforts were particularly successful this year, from the Greenway Sponsored Walk to the Baldock Beer Festival. Group Lead Volunteer Report

Introduction

2024 has been an exciting and successful year for the 2nd Baldock Scout Group as we celebrated our 70th birthday with a number of fantastic group events.

Highlights

- **Summer BBQ and Fun Evening:** Held at St. John's School, this event was a huge success, bringing together our community for a night of fun and celebration.
- **Biggest Camp Ever:** We hosted our largest camp to date at Tolmers, with Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, Leaders, and Parents all joining in. It was an unforgettable experience for everyone involved.
- **Ice Skating at Letchworth:** We took over the ice rink, creating magical memories for both young people and adults.

Achievements

- Badge Success: Our Beavers, Cubs, and Scouts earned over 1,150 badges in 2024! A huge congratulations to all the young people for their hard work and dedication. A special thank you to the parent volunteers and 2nd Baldock Leaders for their incredible support and effort in running exciting programs and handling all the necessary admin.
- **Equipment Upgrades:** We refreshed and expanded our equipment to offer even more activities. Significant purchases included:
 - o **Archery Equipment:** We invested in 12 bows, 60 arrows, targets, and netting of various sizes, plus 4 soft archery sets for our younger members.
 - o **Garden Games:** We bought games like soft axe throwing and corn hole, which were a hit at the beer festival.
 - o **New Tents and Shelters:** These will be used by all Sections for various activities.

Community Support

- Grants and Subsidies: We provided over £1,750 in grants to help our Beavers, Cubs, and Scouts attend meetings and activities they might not have been able to otherwise. For more information, visit our Grants and Subsidies Policy.
- Fundraising Success: Thanks to the fantastic efforts of our young people, Leaders, and parents, we raised almost £8,500 in 2024. This allowed us to enrich our equipment, keep costs low, and subsidize great events like ice skating. Additionally, our fundraising efforts helped other organizations raise tens of thousands of pounds to support the community, including the Baldock Events Forum, Baldock Charity Beer Festival, and Baldock Festival.

Volunteering

A heartfelt thank you to all our Leaders, Trustees, and Young Leaders who volunteer their time for meetings, planning, training, safety, and safeguarding. Your dedication is truly appreciated.

- **Volunteer Opportunities:** We are always looking for new volunteers to join our team and help provide even greater experiences for our young people. Currently, we are seeking:
 - Equipment Team Members: To help check out and check in kit, ensuring everything is in order.
 - Trustee Board or Group Support Members: To represent our Beaver and Cub Sections and coordinate fundraising.
 - Section Team Members: To assist with various tasks, from signing up for events to helping with admin and planning.

Proposal to Maintain Current Subscriptions

The termly subscriptions are reviewed annually at the AGM. This year after careful consideration, the Trustees are proposing to maintain the subscriptions at £40 per term. We understand that these subscriptions may represent a significant commitment for some families. If you find yourself in challenging financial circumstances, please don't hesitate to speak confidentially with your Section Leader. We are committed to ensuring that no young person misses out on the Scouting experience due to financial constraints.

Re-Adopting Our Constitution

We follow the proposed UK Scout Trustee Board Constitution found in the POR (Policy, Organisation and Rules) document as amended for March 2024 (and updated in June 2024). There are a few sections of the constitution that the Trustee board sets locally and recommends the following to the AGM:


- 1. All Trustees will be elected to a 3-year term from the AGM at which they were elected
- 2. The Trustee Board should have 10 Trustees in total. This includes ex officio and co-opted Trustees.
- 3. Trustee Board meetings are open for Section Leaders to attend to have input before any votes.
- 4. A quorum for Trustee Board meetings will consist of 3 Trustees and the GLV (or their non-Trustee representative)
- 5. A quorum for future Group Scout Council meetings will consist of 10 members.

Treasurer's Report

In 2024 we a great year and made a surplus of £2,097, based on total income of £28,484 against £26,387 in expenses.

The chart below illustrates our <u>net</u> income and expenditure, grouping like items together and shows our net income and expenditure more clearly. For example, the net cost of £1,255 for the youth programme and activities (camps and events) is comprised of £13,286 in income and £14,541 in expenses.



In 2024 we had our best year ever for fundraising, raising a total of £6,314 after expenses. We also raised £5,956 in net subscriptions, including £1,627 from reclaimed gift aid. The remainder of our income came from bank interest, hiring out our griddle and general donations.

This income was used to fund the camps and other activities for the beavers, cubs and scouts, which cost £1,255 net, after contributions from parents. Our biggest expense however was £4,293 net in new equipment, and thanks to the better than expected fundraising we were able purchase archery and shooting equipment for the group and replace some worn out tents. This will widen the range of activities that we're able to provide in the future and also reduce our costs by not having to hire this equipment. We were also able to take the beavers, cubs and scouts ice skating which we were able to provide at no cost to the children as a thank you for all of your continuing support.

Our second biggest expense at £1,790 was inclusion (the hardship fund), and we continue to provide support for children whose parents are unable to meet the full cost of subscriptions and events themselves. It's extremely important to us that no child misses out on scouting due to their financial circumstances. Please speak to one of us if you would like to discuss how we can help you.

The remainder of our expenses were badges, insurance, rent, the cost of running the Online Scout Manager platform.

The surplus we have earned this year will be put to good use. We are expecting to maintain our inclusion funding at a similar level in 2025, but we will also put money aside for long-term needs and contingencies.

We thank you all for your continuing support and hope that 2025 is another fantastic year for scouting!

Beaver Section Report

Beavers had an exciting year, completing 16 badges and joining in with lots of outdoor activities.

Spring

We started the year by covering the 'Global Issues' badge where we looked at Fairtrade, including trying Fairtrade food! We also discussed the issue of access to clean water and made our own water filters.

We then went on a Night Hike around Weston Woods, taking the opportunity to get a head start on our Space badge by looking at constellations from the top of Gibbet Hill.

Back at the hall, we covered the Space badge for the next two weeks using torches to make pin hole projections of constellations, learning about the planets and life on the International Space Station.

We finished the term with the Safety badge, where the Beavers learnt about the Green Cross Code, road safety and rail safety. They even practised their skills by going for a walk to use the zebra crossing on South Road and the crossing towards the roundabout.

For our Nights Away badge, we joined Cubs for a sleepover at Wymondley Woods. The Beavers took part in a range of activities around a' Wild West' theme.

Summer

The Summer term started with a walk up to the woods to collect natural resources to be used for the 'Natural Activity' part of the Outdoors challenge badge. Back at the hall, we used them to make nature tiles, pressing them into clay squares.

We then covered the Photography badges and Cycling badges, with half of the Colony taking part in one

badge each and then swapping the next week. To earn their photography badge, the Beavers took 10 photos around the Church gardens, printed them and used them to make a collage. For the Cycling badge, Beavers brought their bikes and discussed riding safety, wearing a helmet, pumping a tyre and showing that they could ride for a short distance.

The Beavers enjoyed a trip out to Fun Rings at Gosling Sport Park in Welwyn. They loved sliding down the hill on their donuts and most even managed to pull them back up the hill again!



Our next meeting was the 70th birthday celebrations. Beavers and their families enjoyed joining other Sections and past members to celebrate with games, bouncy castle and BBQ.

After half term, we covered the Musician badge, learning campfire songs ready for our group camp. We also snuck in the knots section of the Outdoor challenge badge. Beavers learnt reef, overhand and slipped half hitch. I wonder how many they can still remember!

We took the Beavers back up to Weston Woods to explore for parts of the World Challenge badge and Adventure Challenge badge. They enjoyed looking for minibeast, climbing the fallen trees and finding new paths.

The Beavers then had a great meeting at Boyd camp site where they earnt their first Time on the Water badge by taking part in rafting. They also covered 'Adventurous activity' for Adventure Challenge badge by practising soft archery (thanks to James from Scouts for helping!) We also managed to sneak in parts of both the Camp Craft Badge and Adventure Challenge badge by practising pitching tents. They were pretty good!

Beavers loved camping outside with the rest of our group at Tolmers. They took part in Tunnels, Water Wars, made dens and joined in with campfire.



Autumn

Beavers started the Autumn term with the Digital Maker badge where they discussed technology and how it can make our lives easier. They designed a graphic for their own computer game and practised programming by giving instructions to make jam sandwiches. This is always a favourite activity as the Leaders take the instruction very literally and it all goes horribly wrong!

Next, we looked at the International badge. We tried foods from different counties and voted on our favourites, shared different ways we knew how to say 'hello' and learnt about Beaver groups around the world.

We had a fabulous visit from Safari Stu (always a firm fave with the Beavers!) They handled a chameleon, cockroaches, a tortoise, lesser tenrecs, a chuckwalla and even a massive spider!





Then, Beavers covered the Disability Awareness badge. A massive thanks to George's mum who provided a range of equipment for the Beavers to try. They also learnt to finger spell their names and we had an amazing visit from The Guide Dogs for the Blind Association. The children loved meeting Sage and her owners.

To earn their Cooking badge, the Beavers made a range of dishes, including savoury French toast. Yum!

We also managed to fit in a sleepover in 1st Baldock's Scout Hall. We walked to the fish and chip shop for dinner and took part in a range of 'Pirate' inspired activities.

We ended the year with a group ice skating trip. It was lovely to see all the Young People from across the group get together to celebrate the end of the year. Thanks to all the parents that came along to help.

Cubs Section Report

I'm never quite sure how we manage to fit so much into a year, but the Cubs have embraced the opportunities provided and this has resulted in over 380 badges being awarded over the year.








This year was the first year in decades that we didn't go to PGL due to the rising costs. Instead, we went to Gilwell



Volunteering

We're very fortunate to have fantastic Leaders that give up their time every week. All Leaders are unpaid volunteers and juggle Scouting commitments around work and home responsibilities.

In order to help meetings run smoothly, we ask each Scouting family to help out at one meeting a term and one-two fundraising events a year. This supports us in delivering an interesting programme and helps raise money for the equipment and resources needed by each Section.

If you'd rather donate financially than give time at a fundraising event, then please speak to us or email to arrange.

Parents are also needed before and after camps to help bring or take back kit or dry tents (after a rainy camp). Please ask Leaders when you collect your child from camp, if any help is needed.

A huge thanks to all the families and Leaders who support Beavers, Cubs and Scouts. We couldn't run without you!

In addition, across our Section we are looking for more help, this may be helping plan a meeting or helping with some of the back end admin during the week, if you are interested to find out more e-mail enquiries@2ndbaldockscouts.org.uk.

Also, often the small things can make a big difference, it may be offering to take rubbish from camp or a meeting to put in the bin at home, or carrying a box from the Church Hall to the container. So, if you have a few mins, the Leaders would love more people to ask 'Anything I can do to help?".



Did you know the amount of time spent planning and sorting kit before and after Camps, is often far more than the Camp itself?

Our Volunteer Leaders as well as giving up their weekends, often have to take Annual Leave in the run-up to camp and on return from camp, to sort all the equipment out.

Therefore, we are looking to recruit a small team of volunteers to help support them.

Time Required: Up to about 6 hours per month (usually split between the week before and after a camp), this can be flexible during the day or evening.

The areas we would be looking for the team to support are:

- Keeping the stores tidy and safe
- Make sure the kit is available for camps
- Assisting in the preparation of kit before a camp
- Ensuring all the kit is checked and put away after camp
- Recommendations for repairs etc.

Also, any specialist skills that can be provided to help maintain and support equipment would be great
